Dallas Symphony Orchestra leads six Dallas ISD summer programs

Representatives from Dallas Symphony Orchestra taught music lessons at several Dallas ISD elementary schools during the summer. They have begun a program to put instraments in the hands of children who have had no previous access to instruments.

Students learned the basics about reading a music sheet and interacted with many different instruments, most of them for the very first time. DSO organized the first Youth Concert for Dallas ISD students almost 100 years ago, said Jamie Allen, DSO Director of Education. Since then, both entities have collaborated to supplement the district's music curriculum with high level concert training and experiences that are not otherwise available.

"For young musicians, the overall goal is to provide those students who want to play an instrument with lessons and an instrument free of charge," Allen said. "We want to remove all barriers to making music as it provides so many opportunities artistically and beyond."

Marcela Ingram teaches math at Kahn Elementary School and is the summer site supervisor at the campus. She saw the students were noticeably excited to partake in music lessons and try out different instruments. "Every week they have to pass a test in order to take their instrument home," Ingram said. "They have to learn responsibility and discipline because they have to keep up with a notebook, bring their instrument every day."

The Young Musicians Program is a collaboration between DSO and Dallas ISD's Extended Learning Opportunities. However, DSO will continue providing music lessons to Dallas youth for free! All Dallas ISD students, grades 2nd through 5th, can participate in free Young Musicians programs throughout the school year.

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MEMBERSHIP MATTERS

Q&A with Patron Member Darlene Clark

As part of our ongoing series "Membership Matters," we thought it would be interesting to find out why individual membership in TASO matters. **Darlene Clark (Darlene)**, who is not new to TASO but joined this year as a first time Patron Member, agreed to be interviewed and talk about the benefits of individual membership with TASO. She also reveals some things about herself we think you will find fascinating!

Membership: Are you new to the TASO board? Which guild are you affiliated with and how long have you been involved with your guild?

Darlene: No, I have been a member of the TASO Board on and off (mostly on) for around 4 years. I am affiliated with the Houston Symphony League and have been a member since 2006.

Membership: You joined TASO at the Patron level. What inspired you to join as an individual? **Darlene:** The opportunity to share Symphony volunteer experiences statewide and learn from the other organizations.

Membership: What are some of the benefits you've received being a TASO board member? **Darlene:** Sharing information and processes statewide, learning more about advocacy, and meeting fun and like-minded individuals from all over Texas.

Membership: Do you play an instrument (or have played an instrument)? If so, name the instrument and why. **Darlene:** Flute, piccolo and piano. I was always drawn to the piano. I would sit at my grandmother's piano at 4 years old and create chords and play arpeggios, not knowing what they were. I begged my mom for a piano, but since she was forced to take lessons and hated it, she figured I would feel the same way. When it was time to choose a band or orchestra instrument, I chose the flute (blame "Color My World" and anything from Jethro Tull) and still play in the Gulf Coast Concert Band, which is basically a high school band for "seasoned musicians." I've probably performed the piccolo solo on "Stars and Stripes" more than anyone not in an official military band. One of the more unusual pieces we have performed is a piccolo/tuba duet in front of a concert band called "The Elephant and the Fly". A year before I retired from AT&T, I bought a Boston baby grand piano and started taking lessons. I am now taking piano lessons from the pianist in the Houston Symphony and flute/piccolo lessons from the piccoloist in the Symphony. Lucky me!

Membership: Bass Clef or Treble Clef? (a little Symphony humor)

Darlene: As a flutist and piccoloist, definitely Treble. However, with my piano lessons, Bass clef has a foothold. I do not even want to think about Viola clef. That's just wrong!

Membership: What do you hope to contribute to TASO as a Patron member and Board member? **Darlene:** I hope to bring my experience with the Houston Symphony League to the table and share all the wonderful activities with the rest of the state.

Membership: Tell us something about yourself that others may not know about you.

Darlene: I have performed with the Houston Symphony twice in a fundraiser called "Share the Stage with the Houston Symphony". I taught yoga for ten years and do a handstand almost every day. I'm a bit of a wine snob.

As you can see, Darlene is but one example of the depth and richness that makes our TASO Board so wonderful. Our membership drive for 2020 will begin shortly after the new year. I encourage each of you to consider joining TASO as an individual member.

She is in the eight grade at Wellborn Middle School. Hannah has been a member of the Houston Youth Symphony since 2018 and currently serves as assistant principal cello. She also was principal cello of the Region 8 orchestra last year. She performed the fourth movement from "Cello Concerto in E Minor" by Edward Elgar. Jeremy No. 15,

is the son of Eun Sug Park and Eun Gvu No and is a sophomore at A&M Consolidated High School. He is a member of the Consolidated orchestra and the Korean Christian Youth Chamber Orchestra. He performed the first movement from "Cello Concerto in C" by Frank Joseph Haydn. Noah Taylor, 17, is the son of Kim Taylor and Zane Taylor and is a junior at College Station High School where he participated in UIL Science and VEX Robotics. He is a member of the school's marching and concert bands. He scored Division 1 ratings in both state solo and ensemble competitions and placed fifth in the area concert band. He played the third movement from 'Concerto No. 1 for Marimba and Strings" by Emmanuel Sejourne.

Chris Hoffman of College Station accompanied all four finalists on the piano. The finalists were judged by Bradley Calame, Adam Mikeal an Penny Zent. The Symphony Belles provided a reception for guests while the judges made their decisions and assisted with competition logistics.

Last Spring, students in any area public or private school or home schooled were invited to submit their performance of any movement from any concerto for any instrument. **Dr. Marcelo Busssiki**, music director/ conductor of the Brazos Valley Symphony, judged the entries blindly and chose the finalists, who were invited to perform their entry from memory at the finals.

Hannah Jeong captured the first place with her performance of the fourth movement from "Cello Concerto on E Minor" by Edward Elgar. The three professional judges were wowed by her performance.

Texas Arts Advocacy Day 2019!

On February 5th, over 180 arts leaders and advocates spoke up at Texans for the Arts' 2019 Texas Arts Advocacy Day. Traveling from across the state, participants spent the morning learning about the issues, at lunch enjoying music in the Rotunda, and then an afternoon making over 80 visits with their Texas legislators and their staff. They shared important data and their stories about how the arts make a difference in their communities and in their legislators' districts and sharing Texans for the Arts' 86th Session Legislative Agenda.

Plano Symphony Orchestra

The mission of the Plano Symphony Orchestra (PSO) is to inspire, educate, entertain and involve the children, youth and adults of our community in the enjoyment of great music. PSO organizes many events outside of the subscription concerts in order to be part of the fabric of the community, support our local businesses and cultural events. PSO reaches out to 190,000 North Texans and approximately 40,000 children through various education programs. PSO conducts 250 events a year which include only eight formal concerts. Because the PSO reaches so many businesses, schools and individuals, the city governments and companies provide generous grants to the PSO.

PSO symphony holds 16 School concerts for approximately 40,000 fourth and fifth graders over a two-week period. Public, private and home school students are invited from Collin county and surrounding communities.

PSO Petting Zoo brings working musical instruments to more than 30 events held at festivals and in schools. The idea is to let children touch musical instruments. The Petting Zoo goes to numerous community events each year as well as the Family Symphony series that is held in several communities for kids

There are multiple Christmas concerts in 2 different communities. The concerts

feature guest artists and local choirs as the Symphony plays. At two of the concerts, food is collected before the concert and donated to the Seven Loaves Food Pantry located at St. Andrews Methodist Church in Plano.

PSO orchestra musicians play at schools, jails and old age homes as part of Healing Notes Interactive Music Therapy Program. On March 24, 2019, residents and staff from eight Community Homes for Adults, Inc. (CHAI) had an indoor picnic sponsored by the Congregation Anshai Torah in Plano. A PSO ensemble played Broadway and Disney movie melodies and asked the audience to "name that tune." A second example Is the Salvation Army After School Program partnered with the Bovs & Girls Club provide music lessons during the PISD school year in East Plano.

Fundraising Committee activities include restaurants, sporting events and wine tastings introducing PSO patrons to businesses. In 2019, seventy people attended to the Frisco Rough Riders baseball game. Scholarship Program for 6th and 7th grade students provides free music lessons for an instrument of their choice for the entire school year. In 2019, the PSO performed with dancers from the Ballet Ensemble of Texas, Mexico 2000, and Strutilava School of Classical Indian Dance in a performance as part of the Plano International Festival where the proceeds benefitted the scholarship program. There were 12 scholarships in 2018 and 18 scholarships in 2019 that were awarded.

The Debutante Program that starts in the junior year of senior high school is a two-year program for young women and men (Honor Guard) to prepare for college and beyond. It focuses on life skill education with one of the most popular classes being a car clinic.

Collin County Young Artist
Competition is a one-day event
where children in Grades 1
through 12 compete in for a
grand prize. The best three
performers play with the PSO in a
subscription concert. There were
125 competitors in 2019 with
three overall winners.

The Big Spring Symphony Guild

The Big Spring Symphony Guild is happy to report a hugely successful and well attended kickoff for The Big Spring Symphony's 38th Season -"The Good, The Better and The Beethoven"! The first concert, "The New World", was held on September 14th and Guest Artist, **Fei-Fei Dong**, delivered a breath-taking performance of Rachmaninoff's "Piano Concerto No. 2 in C Minor" as she broke in the Symphony's newly refurbished 1941 Baldwin Concert Grand. She is pictured with Maestro Keith Graumann in the first picture. The audience was also treated to Beethoven's

Interim Legislative Roadmap

Texans for the Arts' "Interim" agenda between the 86th and 87th Texas Legislative Sessions continues to reinforce the importance of ensuring that you and your organizations initiate and grow a positive working relationship with your state legislators (House and Senate) and Congressional leaders, too.

There is a good chance you already know your legislators, but if not, look them up at https:// wrm.capitol.texas.gov/home. Then double check that they are on your mailing list and make sure you are following them on social media (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram). Members are very appreciative of positive social media posts, so this should help create additional goodwill. In addition, sign up for their mailing list so that you can learn more about them and their interests and be certain to invite them to your concerts and events. Include legislative staff in these invitations as their role can be key especially when your legislators are in Austin during the Session.

Find or create opportunities to thank your Texas legislators and acknowledge their support of the arts and for approving the 86th Session Budget that provided the largest appropriation increase to the Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA) in the history of the agency. Texans for the Arts led the legislative strategy that secured these funds including \$10 million for TCA Cultural Districts. (Congratulations to the Dallas Symphony, the Houston Symphony and the Lubbock

Symphony for receiving funding from this appropriation in September 2019.)

Always acknowledge when a legislator is present at an event. Find or create opportunities to give awards (TASO is already doing that at the statewide level, but consider local awards). Use Social Media to promote your events and "tag" legislators in whose districts those events are happening. Consider opportunities to invite legislators to participate on panels, give keynotes, or speak at public events.

Encourage your symphony members to register to vote and to be prepared to vote in all upcoming elections including May 2020 primaries and the November 2020 general election, voting to support arts-friendly candidates. All Texas House members and several Senate members are up for re-election in 2020. Send photos to Texans for the Arts of you with your legislators for us to post on our social media!

Strategic Planning Committee Advocacy Report -

November 19, 2019
Texans for the Arts led the legislative strategy in the 86th
Texas Legislative Session that led to the largest single increase and the largest total budget for the Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA) in the state agency's history.

The final budget approved in the 86th for the Texas Commission on the Arts is \$16.443.083 for 2019-2020 and \$11,493,038 for 2020-2021. These funds include a restoration of \$5 million initially appropriated in the 84th Session and cut in the 85th Session, and an additional increase of \$5 million for a total of \$10 million for the TCA's Cultural District grant program, and a new \$250,000 for the TCA's Arts Respond grants that expressly fund programs that use the arts as a means for healing in working with veterans and active duty service men and women and their families. Since the ending of the Session, the Texas Commission on the Arts has approved funding of 868 grants in its first funding round for fiscal year 2020. The grants total over \$8.9 million and will go to nonprofits and units of government in 111 Texas cities. The Texas Commission on the Arts has approved funding of 43 Arts Respond Cultural District Project grants for fiscal year 2020. The grants total over \$4.6 million and will go to arts nonprofits and local government agencies in 20 cultural districts. The grants ranged from \$5,500 to \$250,000.
