Power of the Arts - The Arts Matter!

Marking the work of the 86th Texas Legislature - January -May 2019

Texans for the Arts is honored to have led the legislative strategy in the 86th Texas Legislative Session that led to the largest single increase and the largest total budget for the Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA) in the state agency's history. (The TCA was established in 1965).

The final budget approved in the 86th for the Texas Commission on the Arts is \$16,443,083 for 2019-2020 and \$11,493,038 for 2020-2021. These funds include a restoration of \$5 million initially appropriated in the 84th Session and cut in the 85th Session. and an additional increase of \$5 million for a total of \$10 million for the TCA's Cultural District grant program, and a new \$250,000 for the TCA's Arts Respond grants that expressly fund programs that use the arts as a means for healing in working with veterans and active duty service men and women and their families.

Texans for the Arts would like to give a particular shout out to Chairman Jane Nelson, Chair of Senate Finance Committee and Chairman John Zerwas, Chair of House Appropriations Committee, (and both leading the Conference Committee) in addition to a "thank you" to all of the legislators and their staffs who worked with us on this effort, all of our member

organizations and individuals who support our work year round, to the Texas Cultural Trust for the important use of the "State of the Arts/Invest in the Arts" economic impact analysis and for providing testimony and advocacy support throughout the session, to all of the attendees at Texans for the Arts Foundation's 2019 Arts Advocacy Day who made over 80 legislative visits, and to the other arts leaders who traveled across the state to testify at House Appropriation and Senate Finance Committee hearings. It has taken ongoing work over the past 19 months to build a strong advocacy case for increasing the state's investment in the arts.

These funds will make a significant difference in the Texas Commission on the Arts' capacity to reach even more citizens across the state with dynamic, engaging, thoughtful and community enriching cultural and arts programming.

In addition to our funding efforts for the Texas Commission on the Arts', Texans for the Arts helped initiate SB1319, the County HOT Transparency Bill. This bill would have required County leadership to submit annual reports to the Texas Comptroller of County HOT % and receipts from across the state some % of which is eligible for arts and cultural tourism funding. While the bill passed in both the House and Senate it got vetoed by the Governor at the 11th hour



due to an unrelated amendment attached to the bill. We would like to thank Senator **Brian Birdwell**, and our partnership with Texas Hotel & Lodging Association, for their support in trying to ensure the passage of this bill. We will start fresh in the 87th Session with a revised version and try again!

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Abilene Philharmonic Guild

It's with cautious optimism that the Abilene Philharmonic Guild is planning its upcoming season. We have been busy with zoom meetings and conference calls charting alternate plans for meetings and belle/beau responsibilities should the need arise. Our Ball co-chairs, Kim Melnyk and Stephanie Johnson. have not allowed the current pandemic to stall their planning. They have been working diligently on putting together a beautiful Gala for our annual fundraiser on February 27, 2021.

The Abilene Philharmonic's Nelda Hodges Young Artist Competition was postponed for three months and eventually the final round was held on June 27, 2020. The winners were: Gold Medalist and recipient of a \$1,500 scholarship, percussionist Ricardo Hinojosa. an incoming senior from Cooper High School in Abilene, Silver Medalist and recipient of a \$1,000 scholarship, cellist Jared Ripple, a recent graduate of Cooper High School, pianist Sarah Chen, an incoming 8th grader at Talkington School for Young Women Leaders in Lubbock, the Bronze Medalist with a \$750 scholarship, and Runner-up honors and season tickets to the Abilene Philharmonic recipient, saxophonist Cole Patterson, an incoming senior at Abilene High School. The Nelda Hodges Young Artist Competition will now be held annually rather than biennially.

The Abilene Philharmonic announced its 70th anniversary

season and Maestro David Itkin has a dynamic season planned. We hope to start with a special concert from Kristin Hertzenberg and Her All-Star Band that carries over from the previous season which was cancelled in the spring. Unfortunately, we were forced to cancel the much-anticipated Canadian Brass concert that was rescheduled for the summer. While things are still in a state of flux, we are all hopeful that we will all be able to attend our beautiful live concerts soon. Despite the shutdown and loss of our live concerts, the donors to the Abilene Philharmonic rose to the occasion and in May, Abilene Gives was a huge success. Donors to the orchestra gave five times the amount of money they did in previous years. Now that's a cause for optimism!

Our fiscal year ended well in spite of the season being cut short. The Amarillo community is

very supportive. Guild President **LaDonna Tunnell** says the Guild was able to raise over \$60,000.00, for our programs and our symphony.

This year the Guild and the Symphony have new branding and are making some changes to our fundraisers and programs which I will tell you about as the year unfolds.

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Big Spring Symphony Guild

Prior to the COVID-19 Shutdown, The Big Spring Symphony (BSSO) and The Big Spring Symphony Guild were having a very successful season. Both the BSSO and the Guild were seeing major increases in fundraising numbers, ticket sales and attendance.

The 38th season, entitled, "The Good. The Better and The Beethoven"had a well attended kick-off week in September as reported in the TASO 2019/2020 Winter Newsletter. There was a near capacity crowd in the Big Spring Municipal Auditorium for "The Nutcracker Ballet", featuring The Midland Festival Ballet on December 14th. Patrons came from all over Texas and it was a very special night, partially funded by a special \$10,000 grant from H-E-B Tournament of Champions. The Midland Festival Ballet did an outstanding job helping the audience capture the sprit of the season. At the close of the event, candy canes were distributed to the patrons by the Guild that were donated by Big Spring Ford. The Guild raised over \$1000 for their music student scholarship program with their Nutcracker ornament sales, water sales and the "Tips for Scholarship" Jar.

The February 8th, 2020 concert celebrated Beethoven's 250th birthday and featured guest conductor, Maestro John Giordano, along with a special guest artist soprano, **Nicole Keeling**. Keeling is the daughter of long time BSSO Principal

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Trombone Player, Doctor **Bruce Keeling**. The patrons were treated to a mix of Broadway and Pop to go with their Beethoven as Keeling stole their hearts with her incredible voice. Guest Conductor, Maestro John Giordano. knocked it out of the park as he led the very talented BSSO musicians. The Big Spring Symphony Guild hosted a Beethoven Birthday Party Reception at the close sponsored by Prosperity Bank and also celebrated another great fundraising intake on water sales and the "Tips for Scholarships" Jar.

Unfortunately in March, the Guild's big spring fundraiser with a Beethoven Birthday Party theme was postponed along with BSSO's Queen Concert with Guest Artists, Jeans 'N Classics that was scheduled for April. The July 3rd Pops in the Park Celebration was also canceled by the city and as of press time, all indoor large venues are still closed in Big Spring. The patrons and community have been very kind and patient thru this ordeal and still pledge their support when the new season begins.

Keith Graumann, Music Director and Conductor of the Big Spring Symphony, the BSSO Board and The Big Spring Symphony Guild are working very hard to bring Howard County and surrounding areas the great music experience they expect, while keeping the health and safety of their patrons at the top of their priority list. With high hopes for the ongoing

crises to improve, they marched on with plans for their 39th Season.

In a recent press release, Dr. Keith Graumann discussed the new season and the COVID-19 precautions. "We have obviously had to adjust our plans due to the Pandemic and social distancing requirements," he said. "While I had originally planned a season using a large number of players and adding extra players to several concerts, I have adjusted our plans and we will use a normal size orchestra in order to accomplish proper social distancing. Due to the many adjustments that have been made. I have entitled the season 'The Versatile Big Spring Symphony'." Graumann continued, "We will provide social distancing for the audience at our concerts in the Municipal Auditorium by skipping seats between individuals. couples or family groups. Social distancing will be a little more challenging for our players. For one thing, the winds and brass will not be able to wear masks. However, we can separate the players more than usual and move the entire orchestra downstage toward the audience providing more space between players. This will require adjustments in tuning and balance, another reason to call the season: 'The Versatile Big Spring Symphony'.

We have twice rescheduled our April Pops concert from last season and we will now perform 'The Music of Queen' on October 17, 2020. We will honor all tickets from last season and will include it as an extra concert for our upcoming season subscribers."

Maestro Graumann gave a brief synopsis of the upcoming season: "Our opening concert is on September 19, 2020and is entitled 'A Breath of Fresh Air'. We will feature Beethoven's Pastoral Symphony, No. 6, a work that will be refreshing and entertaining for our audience. We will also feature one of my favorite artists, cellist **Jeffrey Lastrapes**, who will play the Elgar cello concerto.. 'The Music of Queen' will follow on October 17, 2020 as previously mentioned.

We will perform a 'Holiday Spectacular' on December 19, 2020. This is one of my favorite concerts to present and will include holiday favorites, singalongs, vocal ensembles and soloists. We will feature students of Gershom Garcia as well as soloists Lawrence Thibeault and Tara Trowbridge.

Our winter concert will be on February 6, 2021 and is entitled 'Out of this World'. Maestro John Giordano will guest conduct. We will announce a guest artist for this concert as plans are finalized. Our final concert of the season, 'Pops Extravaganza' will be on April 24, 2021 and feature 'The Texas Tenors'. The three 'Texas Tenors' are each well known artists in their own genres and include pop, country and operatic repertory. Their popularity has grown exponentially recently. Their performance with our orchestra will be a very fitting finale for our season, 'The Versatile Big Spring Symphony'."

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Dallas Symphony Orchestra League

\$954,722 was raised by the Dallas Symphony Orchestra League for DSO's Education and Outreach Initiatives.

"Because of the dedication of the Board of Directors, League members, and generous donors, I am pleased to announce that the Dallas Symphony Orchestra League will be making a gift of \$954,722 to the Dallas Symphony Orchestra's Education and Outreach initiatives," said League President **Kim Brannon**.

With pandemic restrictions in place, Kim ended her year as President through a Zoom video call with the board members to make the announcement of the gift and the turnover of leadership to the new President **Anne Ligon**. Kim held up the gavel for all to see which will later be given in person. The call was held on Wednesday, May 13 at the exact time their normal annual meeting would have been held.

"It has been the privilege of my lifetime to serve as the Dallas Symphony Orchestra League 2019-2020 President," said Kim.

An hour later, DSO President & CEO **Kim Noltemy** arrived at her home for the check exchange and board members surprised her with a drive by parade. The members kept 6 feet social distancing requirements while driving by in their cars decorated with festive signs and balloons. DSO Trumpet player **Kevin Finnamore** made a surprise visit and played a brief celebratory serenade from the

Plano Symphony Orchestra

During the COVID-19 VIRUS Pandemic, the Plano Symphony Orchestra (PSO) has adapted and changed the way we provide music to our subscribers and the public. The following actions have been taken to keep Board and Guild members informed, subscribers and the public engaged, and to acquire new and additional funds.

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2020-2021 SEASON: The PSO plans to perform a full 8-concert subscription season of performances, commencing in September 2020 and ending in April 2021. Any performances that cannot be performed live will be moved to the summer months. We are working with our performance venues to implement new health and safety measures that follow local and state public health COVID-19 guidelines. In addition, the PSO has been exploring new ways to engage our subscribers who may be reluctant to attend a live concert. In that regard, we are exploring "live streaming" our concerts for ticket holders who choose not to attend in person. Subscription ticket sales are ongoing and, while behind last year's rate, are still very encouraging.

The Zoom Life: Zoom is a lifesaver! Zoom conferencing software is being utilized for Board and Guild meetings as well as other meetings. The PSO will be hosting a "Virtual Donor Happy Hour with the Maestro" on Thursday, August 20 at 6 pm. There will be short videos and Q&A sessions.

ADULT CONCERTS: When faced with the COVID-19 outbreak this spring, the PSO was forced to cancel the remainder of our 2019-2020 season. Fortunately, most ticket holders chose to donate the value of their tickets back to the PSO in lieu of receiving a refund. At that time, we began

exploring new ways to bring music to our community. Fifteen broadcasts of past performances were shown on Saturday evenings for free via the PSO website and YouTube, beginning in March 2020. Response to the broadcasts was very positive. This program has kept our patrons engaged and has been viewed as far away as Mexico. Since the PSO Patriotic Pops concert could not be presented live, the 2016 concert was broadcast on July 4, 2020 and was also made available at the Dallas Arboretum.

CHILDREN CONCERTS: The PSO presented a live Family Concert on June 21, 2020 at a venue where appropriate social distance practices were achieved. The PSO also partnered with the Plano Public Libraries and sponsors, Ebby Halliday Realtors and the Plano Rotary Club, to present virtual musical story-times geared towards pre-K and early elementary school children.

SOCIAL MEDIA: A major success story! Since the pandemic started, the PSO has seen an extraordinary increase in its social media presence. Social media engagement has increased 700% based on Facebook analytics, due to a regular calendar of



weekly posts designed to help tell the PSO's story and thank our donors. Information on our virtual concerts were posted on Facebook, as were updates on our Emergency Relief Fund. All donors who contributed were thanked. During this time, the PSO has also introduced to the public PSO staff members, musicians, and volunteers on Facebook.

EMERGENCY RELIEF FUND:

The PSO Board of Directors set up an Emergency Relief Fund. The purpose was to help replace lost revenue from concerts and educational programs. To date, the PSO has raised \$47,300.00 from 105 donors, of which 63% are new donors to the PSO. In addition, the PSO has received grants from TCA and TACA. For the upcoming season, the Dallas Foundation AWARE organization has provided a grant for our Healing Notes program. Several organizations have renewed their sponsorship as well.

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San Angelo Symphony Guild

Greetings from the San Angelo Symphony Guild!

We hope this publication finds you all doing well as we learn to navigate these uncertain times.

We are thrilled that we did have a chance to complete our Journey to the East as our gala was held on August 1, 2020. It was previously scheduled for March 21 and then again for May second. We are so very proud of the gala chair mothers and sponsors that persevered to see this through. It was very different in that it is usually an event of 300+ people and had to be only 60 due to space restrictions.
