TASO Conference in Waco Cancelled for 2021

CANCELLED!

After consulting with an Ad Hoc Conference Committee of TASO in October. The Waco Symphony Council (WSC) has no choice but to cancel Creating Connections TASO 2021 in Waco, April 8-10. 2021. The WSC was willing to postpone until April 2022, but the Lubbock Symphony Guild was unable to postpone their conference planned for 2022. We are sad about this decision but hopefully Waco will be able to invite TASO back in the near future when delegates will be able to once again hear the Waco Symphony and enjoy our beautiful city and the many opportunities it has to offer.

Rationale:

- 1. The Hilton Waco is not able to offer us all the services necessary to host the conference.
- 2. The 2021 Juanita Miller Competition was postponed until 2022 so there will be no winners to present in 2021.
- 3. Even if the Waco Symphony Orchestra is able to play the April concert, because of social distancing, it is unlikely there would be tickets available for TASO delegates.
- 4. Other options for meetings and/or meals were investigated but not feasible under the circumstances.

looks forward to the time we can welcome TASO back to our city for a conference and share and exchange ways to promote symphonies in Texas.



Zoom Craft Party

Leading up to the first Livestream Family Concert in 2020, the Craft Committee. led by Kristin Turnak and **Ann Tornyos**, prepared a set of instructions for the featured craft - Spooky-Fun Shadow Puppets. The instructions contained patterns and directions about how to make Halloweenrelated shadow puppets and a shadow puppet stage out of a box. A Zoom Craft Party was held on October 7th to conduct a "dry run" (test) of the craft instructions before they were sent to all families attending the Livestream Family Concert on October 31st.

During the Zoom Craft Party, everyone shared their experience as well as showed off the shadow puppets and puppet stages they had made using the craft instructions and templates.

The Symphony Education
Committee then collected the shadow puppet and shadow puppet stage examples made by the craft volunteers. These examples were incorporated into the final activity instructions sent to all families that would attend the Livestream Family Concert on October 31st.

The final activity instructions, which were displayed on a private web page, contained several activities the families could do together leading up to and the day of the Livestream Family Concert. These activities included fun educational activities, Halloween-inspired dessert recipes to bake, and the Spooky-



Chavez feeder pattern, which includes Lewis Elementary, Ortiz Middle School and Chavez High School. They are delighted to be working again with the Lewis Elementary after-school violin students soon and are grateful for the school's commitment to find creative ways to keep music in the students' lives during the Covid crisis.

Additionally, the Symphony wanted to share a recent project in which musicians from the orchestra created unique resources to help high school string students prepare for the Texas Music Educators Association's Texas All-State auditions. Musicians MuChen Hsieh, Sheldon Person, Louis-Marie Fardet, and Andrew Pedersen recorded each of the All-State excerpts and provided specific instructions on how best to prepare for these auditions for violin, viola, cello and bass students, respectively. This project is an example of how they have been able to use technology to reach students at a larger scale this year: In a normal year, they may have done similar inperson sessions for just a small number of students; this year, however, these videos were sent to 100 schools and 26 school district Fine Arts Directors. Plano Symphony Orchestra

The purpose of the Plano Symphony Orchestra (PSO) scholarship program is to provide the life-changing opportunity of private music instruction to young instrumentalists in the Plano Independent School District (PISD). Private lessons are vital in developing instrumental technique and many Plano families cannot afford the additional cost. The number of scholarships awarded is based on the funding available and the number of applicants. The PSO was recently awarded an ArtCentre of Plano "For the Love of the Arts" award for the scholarship program.

The PSO Education Scholarship program awards funds to provide weekly private instruction for both fall and spring semesters to deserving students in middle school that have shown clear musical potential and a demonstrated financial need. Applications are submitted by 6th and 7th graders in the spring. As a part of the application process, each applicant has to submit a referral form from their music director, an essay on why they want to take private instrument lessons and how the lessons will improve their musical abilities. provide character reference and parental approval. A committee selects the award recipients during the summer months and they are notified prior to the beginning of the school year. A student is eligible to win scholarships for both years.

Approved PISD private instructors are assigned to recipients by



school music directors. Normally, private instruction is in person, but during these challenging times, instruction has continued virtually.

To date, 57 scholarships have been awarded. Fifteen scholarships were awarded for 2019-20. The winners were announced via social media. A Sunday afternoon virtual reception was held for new scholarship winners and patrons for a personal connection.

Funding for the program comes completely from donations from the community. The PSO has partnered with numerous sources including the PISD Council of PTAs, the Dallas Asian American Youth Orchestra and the Plano International Festival to raise funds for the program. In the past, the PSO has had a "white

envelope" campaign where at every Board and Guild committee meeting, a white envelope was passed and committee members were encouraged to donate \$1.00. Because of the pandemic and all meetings being virtual, the Education committee developed a new campaign for raising funds for the 2021-2022 scholarship program. The scholarship committee designed and had printed yard signs saying "A Music Lover Lives Here" as shown in the photograph. During October, 2020, patrons of the PSO were asked to give \$25.00 or more as a one-time donation. As a reward for this donation, yard signs were delivered to each patron who donated. The campaign was advertised through email and social media. Approximately \$3000 has been raised through this easy campaign.

East Texas Symphony Orchestra

East Texas Symphony Orchestra reaches audience with Sundown Events

As with all orchestras in 2020, the East Texas Symphony Orchestra, based in Tyler, TX, has had to find new ways to connect with audiences during the COVID-19 pandemic. In October 2020, ETSO hosted a series of four small-ensemble concerts in the community that reached both long-time patrons and new audiences.

"Sundown with the Symphony" featured string, wind, and brass ensembles from the orchestra's core group of musicians performing outdoor programs of light classical and popular music. Limited space was available at each venue for live. socially-distanced audiences. In addition, each performance was livestreamed on the orchestra's Facebook page to reach a broader audience. Events were held at the city's three country clubs: Willow Brook, Hollytree, and The Cascades. The fourth venue chosen for the series was the popular local hangout True Vine Brewing Company.

For many of the musicians involved in these programs, this was the first time they were able to perform for an audience in months. "Everything got canceled [with the spread of COVID-19]," said ETSO Music Director **Richard Lee**. "We miss playing. Really, I don't know if people understand how crazy it is to lose your livelihood."

Lee was referring to the fact that for the orchestra musicians, many



of whom play with a number of different ensembles, there has been little to no work since the pandemic struck.

ETSO principal trumpet, **James Sims**, echoed Lee's sentiments prior to the event at The Cascades: "When we had the show at Hollytree it was literally for some of those people the first time playing with other people in months. It's crazy for a musician to go that long and not play together with anyone."

The balancing act that had to be found for the events was to care for the health and safety of the musicians and audience while meeting the desire to enjoy live performances in person. Through the challenges, the end result proved popular enough that the orchestra is looking at continuing such small, pop-up events in the future, even after it is safe for the full orchestra to return to the concert hall.

"Sundown with the Symphony" was spearheaded by ETSO Vice-

Chair of Development Debbie Kavanaugh, ETSO Board Chair Laura Hyde, and community volunteer Helen Israel. Special cocktails and dinner menus were offered to guests at the country club events. ETSO board members Annette Findley and Diane Thomas assisted Debbie and Helen in creating table decorations for each event. These ETSO performances were sponsored by Joyce Buford, Dr. Rachel and Matt DeVaney, Annette Findley, Laura and H. T. Hyde, Helen and Dr. Noah Israel. Michelle Neilson and Mark Russell, Julie and Dr. Suman Sinha, and Joi and Dr. Gary Smith.

The October meeting entitled "Juggling into a New Year" seemed to fit how we all feel in this time.


"Under the Big Top ",our November luncheon meeting, went well in a beautiful backyard with music provided by one of our guild scholarship winners.
