Juanita Miller Concerto Competition on Sunday, January 9, 2022



After a year of absence, due to the pandemic, all of us at TASO were thrilled to have the 25th anniversary of the Juanita Miller Concerto Competition on Sunday, January 9, 2022 at the University of Texas at Dallas.

There were 55 applicants for the competition and 36 finalists: 13 piano, 15 strings and 8 woodwinds & Brass. Just being selected as a finalist was quite an achievement for these young musicians. Our judges were: Piano - **Amy Dorfma**n, Vanderbilt University; Strings - **Laura Hamilton**, New York University; and **Rick Giangiulio** - Director of the Greater Dallas Youth Orchestra.

The three first place winners in each division were: Piano, **Bryant Li** from Katy, Texas, 11th grade Strings; **Danielle Yoon**, Frisco, Texas, 10thgrade Woodwinds / Brass; **Lorien Britt** from Fate, Texas, 12th grade.

Grand Prize winner was selected. Congratulations goes to piano student **Bryant Li.** Bryant exquisitely played Rachmaninoff Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini.

The first place winners will have the opportunity to perform their concerto at the TASO Conference luncheon in Lubbock, Texas on April 30th. The Grand Prize winner will perform that evening on stage, with the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra.

The Plano Symphony Orchestra

Anna Hale was an avid volunteer for the Plano Symphony Orchestra (PSO). She passed away on June 24, 2021 after a long and courageous battle with cancer. Anna's contributions were extraordinary because of the success of her efforts and the time commitment to the PSO. Anna served on both the Guild Board and on the PSO Board Education Committee, as well as being available to help at other events like the annual Gala and the Debutante Ball.

Her true love was the PSO Instrument Petting Zoo which is a collection of instruments that are taken to various events in the community that children can see, hear, handle and play. The PSO is dedicating the PSO Instrument Petting Zoo in the memory of Anna Hale for the next two years (PSO 39th and 40th seasons). She managed the Petting Zoo for many years. She arranged the Petting Zoo to be at different venues throughout the year. She made sure that the instruments, tables, PSO pamphlets and the tents for outside events were all available. transported, set up and taken down for each event. She also coordinated volunteer workers. both adults and teenagers, to work the events. The petting zoo participates at approximately 30 events each year including the Plano Balloon Festival. Family Symphony Sundays, Arts Festivals, Plano International Festival. Christmas Tree lighting and other events, some of which span for several days. There was a need for many hours of coverage. This was a huge task

and Anna was always there. Her efforts were herculean and well-done in managing any changes that needed to be handled at the last minute.

Organizers of festivals and other events requested every year that the Petting Zoo return to their venue because of the number of past participants who mentioned that they look forward to the zoo, especially for their children.

The Petting Zoo was known for bringing real musical instruments to these events. This was not only a fun activity, but also educational giving an opportunity for children (and adults) to see, touch, feel and play different musical instruments. Anna had a way to make the Petting Zoo come alive and interesting. In some cases, the parents had to drag their kids away from the table. Children returned to these events to tell Anna that because of the petting zoo they now play an instrument.

Unfortunately, a couple of years ago there was an unexpected flood at the site of the Plano Balloon Festival. The instruments been left overnight under a tent for the next day and were destroyed. Anna arranged a committee to find new instruments and salvage any that could be restored. She also coordinated a social media campaign that was conducted on Facebook and a radio station. Within a few days, the Instrument Petting Zoo was restocked with instruments, and money was collected to perform the restorations. The PSO Petting Zoo was up and running in a very short time. The last part of restoring the zoo was the

repainting of the instrument cases into the fun zoo theme. **Tammy Miller**, who worked with Anna on the petting zoo, arranged for the Plano Senior Art Honor Society and the Shepton High School Art Club to paint the cases.

The PSO Guild had a fundraising breakfast in October, in which Anna was recognized by the Executive Director of the Plano Symphony who announced that the petting zoo will be named for the next two years "The Anna Hale Petting Zoo".

A number of donations to honor Anna were received prior to the breakfast. The breakfast was an intimate affair aimed at those who knew and loved Anna.

People at the Plano Symphony loved Anna. She knew so many people personally. She listened to people. Her work with the petting zoo made a difference in children's lives. Anna is a role model to all of us who knew her and will be missed!

Texans for the Arts

Making Music Together Again – Texas Legislative Updates through COVID and Advocacy Next Steps" From: Ann S. Graham, Executive Director, Texans for the Arts


The very best news is that we are performing live music together again! We are still facing serious challenges caused by the pandemic, and we are adapting by learning to live with COVID-19. Many of us are presenting both live and virtual concerts, but we are finding ways to be together again in person and we are being reminded of how very precious this opportunity is. I say the proverbial "we" as the partnership between Texans for the Arts (TFA) and TASO is strong and I feel TFA is definitely part of the family! Thank you for your support of our work. We appreciate your investment in advocacy and together we work hard to make Texas a better place – with all of our members - through our advocacy work across the arts, culture and creativity industry.

Speaking of advocacy, as of TASO's Fall newsletter, the Texas Legislature had just finished the first one of three Special Sessions that were called by Governor Greg Abbott in the summer of 2021. While the first two Sessions did not directly arts funding issues, Special Session #3 was pivotal to our work. On the agenda of Special #3 was the appropriation of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds – over \$16 billion to the State of Texas. (Note, this does not include the municipal and county ARPA funds, nor other federal investments in state allocations.)

The outcome of Special Session #3, relevant to our work in the arts, was a dedicated \$180 million for "Tourism, Travel, Hospitality, and Business Aid. The final Bill – SB8 - provides \$180.0 million to the Trusteed Programs within the Office of the Governor to implement a new tourism, travel and hospitality recovery grant program." These grants would be capped at \$20,000. (If every grant awarded was \$20,000 that would equal 9,000 funded proposals.) It is our understanding that there is "legislative intent" language that would enable "the arts" to be eligible to apply for funds through these tourism grants.

The coalition of tourism industry leaders representing hotels, restaurants, convention centers, campgrounds, and other tourism related entities made an initial request for \$800 million - an amount more reflective of the real need due to the devastating impact of the pandemic on tourism. According to the Texas Comptroller, "No part of the state economy was injured more deeply by the pandemic than these [tourism, travel and hospitality] industries" which includes the arts and performing arts.

Now that the ARPA funding bill has been passed, the Governor's Office of Tourism will begin to develop a grant program by which to distribute these funds across the sector. We will keep you all updated and work to ensure the arts community is fully apprised of all opportunities in relationship to these grants.
