#### 26th Juanita Miller Concerto Competition Held January 8

A panel of three judges selected violinist **Steve Lu**, an 11th grader from Plano, as grand-prize winner for the 2023 Juanita Miller Concerto Competition on January 8 at the University of Texas at Dallas.

Earlier in the daylong competition, Lu won first place in the strings division. **Ella Tran**, a 12th grader from Arlington, took first place in the piano division. **Helen Lan**, a 10th grader from San Antonio, won the first place in the winds division with her flute.

The judges for the competition are musicians and educators. This year, the judge in the strings division was **Joan Kwuon** from the Coburn School of Music Academy; the judge for the winds/brass division was **Gabriel Beavers** from the Frost School of Music in Miami; and the piano judge was **Kathryn Brown** from the Cleveland Institute of Music.

Student musicians in grades 9 through 12 from throughout the state of Texas are prescreened before they can compete. The first-, second-, and third-place winners in all three divisions are awarded cash prizes. The grand prize winner is awarded the opportunity to perform with the Marshall Symphony Orchestra.

The late **Juanita Miller** of Dallas was the founding president of the Texas Association for Symphony

#### FASO/ Brazos Valley

One of the most anticipated social/cultural occasions in the Brazos Valley this autumn was the recent Luncheon and Vintage Fashion Show, "Puttin' on the Ritz," presented by Friends Association of the Symphony Orchestra (FASO) to benefit the local symphony. About 200 people attended the festive event, held Oct. 20 in the ballroom of Miramont Country Club in Bryan. About \$36,000 was raised for the local symphony.

Flashy flappers, bell-bottomed flower children and bobby soxers in poodle skirts strutted down the runway to up-tempo music and an entertaining narrative of fashion trends from the 1920's to the present, delivered by local symphony volunteer Jean McDermott. A total of twentytwo models, including some area high school students who are members of Symphony Belles, wore vintage fashions on loan from an area community theater group and various individuals in the community. Indeed, some of the adult models wore their own classic ensembles from earlier times, including a couple of exquisite bridal gowns.

Not to be outdone by the models, many attendees dressed in vintage clothing themselves, and prizes were given for the Most Glamorous and Most Authentic costumes. the fashion show featured 66 vintage outfits. He was presented with the Golden Baton Award at this concert. Maestro Heyde, retired at the end of November after 35 years and was only the second conductor in the association's 60-year history.

They also participated in a "ropes course" to build leadership skills and learning to work together as a successful team. Their next events include a Music Appreciation and an Etiquette Course.

On November 15th the WSC hosted the 76th annual Children's Concert "live" after two years of video performances. Three concerts hosted over 4000 fourth and fifth grade students from more than 35 schools. This is always one of the volunteers favorite events!

The San Angelo Symphony Guild started our "Sound of Music" themed year by introducing all Symphony Ambassadors, all Symphony Beaux and Belles and their sponsors at our first general membership meeting. An overview of the year was presented, Guild yearbooks were distributed, and members enjoyed refreshments. In September, we held a combination Etiquette & Technology Class, "I Have

Confidence." Board member

Dr. Crystal Kreitler instructed

on etiquette. Following that
presentation, the Symphony
Beaux and Belles paired up
with Lifetime members present
to answer questions and give

Symphony Beaux and Belles attended Know the Score prior to the November 5 concert. This event is the final rehearsal at the Murphey Performance Hall and is open to middle school, high school, and college students. During Know the Score, students are given a unique opportunity to not only observe a professional ensemble rehearse, but also interact with both the Music Director and select musicians from the orchestra. Guild members also provided a light lunch for the orchestra musicians following their final rehearsal.





Senior Symphony Beaux and Belles were introduced at the concert that evening, and Symphony Ambassadors volunteered at the concert. At our November 6 general membership meeting, the Guild presented \$2,000 in scholarships to four very talented middle/ high school orchestra students: violinist Arabella Dunlap, cellist Tristen Gue: violinist Jersev Wyatt; and Heidi Bundick, who plays in the orchestra and band. Each of these students has great musical aspirations, and Heidi hopes to be the first student from her high school to achieve membership in the All State Orchestra. Stephanie Infante, orchestra teacher at our local Lake View High School, was awarded a \$2,000 grant. She plans to use the funds to create the opportunity for the Lake View orchestra to present their concerts in a performance hall rather than at their school. We are so pleased to be able to present these scholarships and grant as part of our mission to support symphonic music in the

Concho Valley.

Preparations are under way for our 39th Annual Gala "An Evening in Austria" on February 11, 2023. This black tie event will include both a silent auction and a live auction, as well as an elegant plated dinner and dancing to the music of John Irish and his Jazz Band. This multi-generational event will primarily benefit the San Angelo Symphony, but a percentage of the proceeds will be used by the Symphony Beaux and Belles to purchase musical instruments for two local elementary schools.

# Plano Symphony Orchestra

HAPPY 40TH ANNIVERSARY PLANO SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA AND MAESTRO HECTOR GUZMAN

In 1983, a group of musicians came together to form a new professional orchestra that was given the name The Plano Chamber Orchestra. They searched for a conductor and selected a very young dynamic **Hector Guzman** as the maestro. Maestro Guzman grew the orchestra and in 1998 the name was changed to Plano Symphony Orchestra (PSO). Maestro Guzman is still the conductor and continues to grow the orchestra in both size and talent. It is so unusual to have a conductor from inception through 40 years and he's not going anywhere! And, many of the current musicians have played in the orchestra for many years, including a few from the founding group.

Visiting artists welcome the opportunity to return to play with Hector and the symphony. Throughout the years the symphony and Maestro Guzman have accomplished great raport with the concert goers and the community young and old. 158 persons were in attendance at the first concert and now the PSO performs for over 150,000 people each year and our music is embraced by people young and old and from all walks of life at regions of the North Texas community. That is why the symphony and Hector have received special acknowledgments and awards this season. Hector Guzman received the North Texas Performing Arts

2022 Stardust Distinguished
Performing Artist Award. The
Symphony was honored with
the For the Love of Arts Legacy
Award by the ArtCentre of Plano
and the 2022 Obelisk Award
as the Distinguished Cultural
Organization (Nonprofit) by the
North Texas Business Council for
the Arts.

The title for our 40th anniversary year is "Celebrating Connections" because connecting the community to music is the heart of the PSO. Maestro Guzman put together a very special 40th anniversary season of connections. The PSO season opened with the world premiere of a violin concerto written by Hector Guzman's dear friend and local composer Jack Waldenmaier. Unfortunately, Waldenmaier passed away prior to the performance. Hector decided to honor him by performing it with his longtime friend, Guest Artist David Kim, the Concertmaster of the Philadelphia Orchestra. That night the composer's wife was present to hear the world premiere of her husband's concerto.

The following week, the PSO was honored to kick off the 41st Plano Balloon Festival, "Things Are Really Looking Up". This was the first year the PSO has played at the Balloon Festival although our instrument petting zoo is always in attendance. Approximately 14,000 people were introduced to the PSO through this concert. And, in honor of the 40th Anniversary, The City of Plano proclaimed September 22, 2022, as "Plano Symphony Orchestra and Maestro Hector Guzman Day".

The PSO is also connecting with family and friends. Our Holiday season concert features Hector's niece, Fela Dominguez, well known Mexican singer and actress, as one of the Guest Artists. Another concert celebrating the 40th year is called "Hector and Friends". It will feature **Christopher Adkins** on Cello and Jorge Federico Osorio on Piano. Adkins was Hector's college roommate at UNT. Guzman briefly studied piano with Osorio's mother at the Conservatory of Music in Mexico City.

A great tribute to Hector for his 40th year anniversary needed to be celebrated with a Fiesta with a Mariachi Band. The Mariachi Vargas will be featured with the Plano Symphony Orchestra at one of the concerts. The Mariachi Vargas have thrived for five generations. They are considered as the gold standard in mariachi music. Hector has worked with them since 2004. This year, the symphony has received the Arts in American Communities Award from the National Endowment for the Arts due to the appearance of the Mariachi Vargas Band.

Our final concert for the season will be Mahler's Symphony No. 2, "Resurrection" performed with our symphony by guest artists **Angela Wilson**, Mezzo Soprano and **Erin Roth Thomas**, Soprano. The Plano Civic Chorus and the Irving Chorale will be part of the very best symphonies of all time. This monumental collaboration fulfills a long-standing dream for Maestro Guzman to conduct a performance of this piece – an opportunity he considers once in a lifetime. Of course, the PSO could not

have achieved all of the success over the last 40 years without the support and hard work of the PSO Guild which was formed a few years after the PSO. The Guild is the heart of the PSO. The Guild was the presenting sponsor of the November concert and honored with a reception afterward. During this 40th Anniversary Season, in addition to the normal Guild activities of supporting the **Anna Hale** Instrument Petting Zoo, Children concerts, School concerts, receptions, small FUNd raising events, Festive Eve, etc, two special events will be held. One is the annual Gala, "A Ruby Affair Celebrating Connections" which is the PSO largest fundraiser. A second event to be held in the fall is titled "Tune N Fork" and is intended to bring community and local restaurants together. The PSO Guild is the glue that brings the PSO orchestra, patrons and community together for the enjoyment of great music of all kinds.
