2023 Annual TASO 56th Conference to be in Austin!


Awards of Excellence 2022-2023



guests and a fabulous raffle. Last year's event was a sellout raising over \$33,000 and this year's event is sure to be one also.

Plano Symphony Orchestra

The Plano Symphony Orchestra (PSO) Guild has conducted the Collin County Young Artist Competition (CCYAC) since 1985 and has seen many talented young musicians throughout the years. One former winner approached PSO Maestro Hector Guzman at a concert and said that the opportunity to play with the PSO changed his life for the better even after years have passed since the experience.

The PSO Guild chairman for the event is **Gladys Chan** who has done a fabulous job with the event for over twenty years. The event takes many months of preparation. It is labor intensive and it takes a village to make it happen. Over 40 volunteers are needed on competition day.

The competition is divided into three categories: piano, strings, and winds/percussion. There are two divisions: Junior-grades

1-8 and Senior-grades 9-12. Participants must either live in Plano, Frisco, or Collin County; attend a Collin County, Plano ISD or Frisco ISD school, study with a teacher who resides in Plano, Collin County or is a PSO core musician, or be a child of a PSO core musician. Each participant must memorize and perform one or more movements of a concert from the approved repertoire list. Up to twelve Finalists are chosen who then compete for the three Grand Prize positions. The three Grand Prize Winners may come from any category and division and perform their concertos with the PSO orchestra at the March concert.

For the 2023 competition held on January 14, 2023, the application was posted on Friday, October 14, 2022 with a deadline for submittal on Thursday, November 17, 2022. Ninety-six applications were submitted. Each category, piano, winds and strings, is limited to approximately twenty-five contestants per category for the live preliminary round auditions. Twenty-six applications were for piano and twelve were for winds. A whopping fifty-eight were strings. PSO's new assistant conductor, Shira Samuels-Shragg screened the string contestants and selected 15 Juniors and 12 Seniors to compete. Six expert judges, one male and one female, in each category were secured for the preliminary round auditions. The judges were from universities all around the state of Texas. This year's competition was sponsored by First United Bank, Steinway Piano Gallery, and the Plano Symphony Guild.

The competition was held on Saturday, January 14, 2023 at Christ United Methodist Church. Everything went smoothly except that surprisingly two pencils had to be removed from the main audition piano by the piano tuner. But one pencil was still stuck deep inside the piano. An accompanist was finally able to remove that pencil by taking apart the bottom keyboard panel with a screwdriver. Always expect the unexpected!

The Grand Prize Winners were **Melody Guo** (piano, age 15, 10th grade at Townview TAG School in Dallas), **Nicole Johnson** (clarinet, age 17, 11th grade at Liberty HS in Frisco) and **Elim Wong** (violinist, age 12, 6th grade at Schimelphenig Middle School in Plano).

The Grand Prize Winners will perform at the March 18, 2023 concert with the PSO at Christ United Methodist Church. As an introduction to each performer, a short 21/2 minute slideshow

is shown with personal photos and background music provided by the student. It is always an amazing concert with these young talented musicians. The PSO will also be performing the Symphonie Fantastique. A cookie and punch reception sponsored by the PSO Guild will be held following the concert. As their schedule allows, the young artists will have additional opportunities to play for smaller audiences and special events.

Women's Symphony League of Tyler

It has been wonderful for the Women's Symphony League of Tyler to be experiencing events that have been in the planning stages since June.

The East Texas Symphony
Orchestra held its first
performance in November and
received rave reviews. The next
concert in January will feature
Buster Keaton' movie, The
General, with the symphony
playing the background music. The

American Film Institute ranks this as the 18th best American film of all time. There is great anticipation of viewing the movie as our orchestra plays!

The WSL Sustainers held their first gathering in November at Ramsey Fritz Jewelers. Maestro Richard Lee was welcomed and spoke of the ETSO's 2022-2023 season.

WSL celebrated the Christmas season with a general meeting/holiday gathering at the historical Azalea District home of one of our members. We all love a party! The Junior Symphony League held its annual Monster Bowl in October with bowling, costumes and lots of pizza and candy. As a result of their efforts, over \$8,000 will be donated to the East Texas Youth Orchestra and to the WSL music education program.

One of the most important parts of the WSL music education program is the awarding of scholarships for the continuing music instruction of our young artists in the Tyler area. There are three levels of scholarships: elementary/beginners, secondary, and college level. This program has benefitted dozens of young musicians in the past years. To further the funding

of this program, a very large, decorated coffee cup is passed at all WSL meetings for members to donate "loose change" to Sips for Scholarships. It is amazing how it adds up to benefit this most worthy cause.

The Symphony League Ball will be held in April, highlighted by the presentation of 78 JSL members. These young ladies and gentlemen have given hours of volunteering by ushering at all concerts and by helping with WSL projects. The Ball will be the first large event to be held in the new Brookshire Convention Hall. In February, ETSO and WSL collaborated to present the annual School Concerts Link Up, program. This production was attended by elementary schools in Tyler and is part of an ongoing commitment by the WSL to bring music education to our community.

The Lubbock Symphony Guild Annual Winter Ball was held on Saturday, February 4, 2023 at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center Theater and Ballroom. The Master of Ceremony was Mayor **Tray Payne** where he presented 29 Senior Debutantes and introduced 38 Junior Debutantes accompanied by a talented four string quartet from the LSO. Our Winter Debutante Ball celebrated the cheerful colors of red, purple and yellow which highlighted our beautiful Sapphire Duchess Grace Ann Shoop, daughter of Justice Larry Doss and Julie **Doss**. Financial reports are still being finalized, but we expect to make a sizable gift to our Symphony's programs soon!


evening! Musicians from the WSO will be playing in each house during the evening. The Waco Symphony Council is excited to be back at work supporting our orchestra!

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88th Texas Legislative Session Priorities (2023)

(Updated February 1, 2023)

Our primary commitment during the 88th Texas Legislative Session will be threefold: to protect and grow the appropriations to the Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA), the state arts agency, including the TCA's Cultural District grant program; to protect the statutory protections for the arts of the Municipal Hotel Occupancy Tax; and to respond to additional legislative opportunities that advance and strengthen the arts, culture and creative industry across the state.

PROTECT: Municipal Hotel Occupancy Tax

- * Protect use of Municipal and County Hotel Occupancy Tax (HOT) to fund the arts
- * Support legislation in the 88th that will clarify often confusing HOT Tax Code provisions and will create greater transparency in reporting comprehensive municipal and county HOT collections and provisions.

The Hotel Occupancy Tax (HOT) was enacted in 1965 and is levied on the state and, optionally, on the municipal and county levels, to guests renting a hotel or guest room. This tax was created to promote tourism and the convention and hotel industry. In 1977, the Legislature added that "up to 15%" of municipal HOT funds may be dedicated to "the encouragement, promotion, improvement, and application of the arts". This was in acknowledgement that there is a direct correlation between a vibrant and dynamic arts, culture and creative community and a successful tourism and hotel industry.

PROTECT AND INCREASE: Texas Commission on the Arts Funding

- * Protect the Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA) base funding and support Exceptional Item #1 \$3M for "organization" grants with an additional \$5M to meet significant unmet need, and Exceptional Item #2 \$5M for Cultural Districts
- * Promote the important role the legislature's investment of public resources in the arts plays in the vitality, economic health, and civic pride of communities all across Texas.
- * Support and promote the Texas Commission on the Art's Cultural & Fine Arts District Program for the strong role it plays in harnessing the power of cultural resources to stimulate economic development and community revitalization.

- *Support HB323 "Changes the curriculum standards for public schools, buy re-designating "fine arts" as part of the foundation curriculum; it was previously considered part of the "enrichment curriculum"
- *Support HB667 "Requires the Texas Dept of Licensing & Regulation to regulate the profession of music therapy and create a Music Therapist Advisory Board. Outlines the regulatory process for this occupation.
- *Monitor HB1497 "Requires the disclosure of taxes and fees charged for the sale of concerts and other event tickets.
- *Invest in arts education through policy decisions and appropriations. Our goal is to ensure that every student has equal access and opportunity to an art's rich education, which helps prepare our children to succeed in school and life
- *Maintain or increase funding for the Texas Moving Image Industry Incentive Program (film, television, commercial, and digital interactive media incentives). The Moving Image Industry Incentive is vital for keeping the creative industries thriving in Texas. The Texas legislature should increase funding to support economic development initiatives and help prevent Texas communities from losing business to more competitive states.
