Ann Graham to retire as Texans for the Arts Executive

This week Texans for the Arts (TFA), a non-partisan statewide arts advocacy organization, announced that Executive Director Ann S. Graham will retire this fall.

After ten years of dedicated service. Ann S. Graham. **Executive Director of Texans** for the Arts (TFA), will retire on October 31st, 2023. Under Ann's outstanding and effective leadership, Texans for the Arts has experienced exponential growth and success, solidifying its role as the state-wide champion for public funding for the arts. Graham's relentless advocacy efforts oversaw an historic increase - quadrupling appropriations to the Texas Commission on the Arts and resulting in more public support for arts organizations across the state, increasing TFA organizational memberships by 100%, passing landmark Hotel Occupancy Tax legislation, laying the foundation for enlisting, training and engaging hundreds of citizen leaders.

When asked about her greatest accomplishment, Graham is most proud of raising the public's awareness of the deeply valuable intersections of the arts to community life, making the case as to why investing public resources in the arts is a vital contribution to community health. Graham never passed up an opportunity to ensure that "the arts are in the room" when

discussing and taking action around the public investment in the arts.

During the time of COVID, Graham played a pivotal role in securing COVID relief funding for arts organizations across the state, including CARES, SVOG, and ARPA. She helped plant the seed of the idea in Houston which led to \$5 million for Houstonbased arts organizations through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Graham ensured once again that the arts were "inthe-room" with the Texas Travel Industry Recovery Program, which distributed \$180 million to the travel, tourism and arts, and she is currently serving on the Governor's Office of Broadband/ Capital Regional Task Force.



DSOL Debutantes Participate in Divot Stomp at Annual Honor Guard Polo Cup

The annual Honor Guard Polo Cup was held at the Prestonwood Polo Club in Oak Point on June 24. Divot stomping is a longstanding tradition where spectators converge on the field to stomp down the turf that has been torn up by the ponies' hooves. Miller is the son of Tincy Miller who founded the Presentation Ball in 1987. He was among the first group of Honor Guards in the inaugural year.
