Texas Association of Symphony Orchestras (TASO) held the 27th Annual Juanita Miller Concerto Competition at the Meadows School of the Arts on the campus of Southern Methodist University. Students in grades 9-12 from throughout the state of Texas competed in three divisions: strings, winds/brass, and piano. The three first place winners received cash awards and the Grand Prize winner will have the opportunity to perform with a Texas orchestra.

Judges selected from 16 piano contestants, 14 string contestants, and 10 the windsbrass division contestants. The competition chairman was Venise Stuart from the Dallas Symphony Orchestra League. Darlene Morford from the Plano Symphony Guild serves as the TASO president. In attendance was Patsy Donosky, daughter of the late Juanita Miller. In 1997, Juanita and Henry S. Miller provided the initial underwriting and subsequent gifts to fund this youth competition, which now bears her name. It was Mr. and Mrs. Miller's dedication, vision, generosity and devotion to music that led to the establishment of a statewide youth competition for outstanding high school musicians. In hosting this competition, TASO continues to employ a professional approach for selecting the winners by choosing outstanding judges from across the country.

Piano judge Rachel Heard is

from Jackson, Mississippi, She currently serves as the Director of Millsaps Conservatory of Music. She is active as a performer/and teacher. She holds performance degrees from The Juilliard School and a doctorate from Rutgers University. Emily Ondracek-Peterson. strings judge. is Executive Director of the Diehn School of Music at Old Dominion University. Dr. Emily Ondracek-Peterson is a leader in numerous fields. She holds performance degrees from The Juilliard School and a doctorate in education from Teachers College, Columbia University. Winds & Brass judge Mark Kellogg is from the Eastman School of Music. He has embraced a wide range of musical roles throughout his career. Inn addition hee holds the position of Professor of Trombone at the Eastman School of Music.

The competition is held annually with the next one scheduled on Sunday, January 5, 2025.

Plano Symphony Orchestra Guild

Tune-N-Fork, A Communnity Music Party

The mission of the Plano Symphony Orchestra is to inspire, educate, entertain, and involve the children, youth, and adults of our community in the enjoyment of great music. Like many orchestras, we are always looking for new ways to introduce the PSO to our community. especially young adults. While we have plenty of traditional and family oriented concerts, what we needed was a fun event in a casual environment that features music to involve more of the community. Thus, an outdoor event featuring small bites from local restaurants, beer, wine and soft drinks and plenty of music seemed just the ticket. The inaugural "PSO Tune-N-Fork, a Community Music Party" was held on October 7, 2023 from 7 to 11pm. The event was sponsored in part by the City of Plano. Gregory Patterson, and Ellie and Ira Barash. Ellie Barash and Rebeka Ecker were the co-chairs of this event.

We knew there would be a learning curve for this type event, so we wanted to start small with a target audience of 100 to 150 people. More than 125 people actually attended. While we would like to grow this event into a fund raiser for the PSO, this year's target was to cover our costs for the event and we were successful with that goal. We also achieved another goal of partnering with a number of local organizations to bring a fun event for the community.

The event was held at the ArtCentre of Plano, located in downtown Plano. The majority of the event was held outdoors, but access to the main and auxiliary buildings was included along with tables and chairs. The Honorable John B. Muns, Mayor of Plano, and Councilman Rick Horne attended. The mayor spoke at the event stating that he was delighted that the symphony is part of his city. He sees how the symphony reaches out to the community to all generations to give them the opportunity to enjoy this wonderful pleasure.

Food was donated by several different restaurants from Plano. The restaurants brought their favorite hot or cold food. There were appetizers, desserts, fancy cookies, and ices with or without liquor. The restaurants were asked to provide food for 150 people. Beer, wine and soft drinks were also provided. A food truck was added as a backup to ensure that there would be enough food. As it turned out, the seven restaurants provided ample food, so the food truck was not necessary. A variety of music was offered, from ballet to iazz. The entertainment included soprano Haley Sickling, North Texas Performing Arts (band and singer), Ballet Metropolitan and a PSO sax quartet.

The venue, food, entertainment,

security, video recording of the event, and lighting were needed and secured. Volunteers were needed for setup, breakdown at the end of the event, serving of food and drinks, and registration. Volunteers included PSO Board and Guild members, high school volunteers with their parents, and the "Sign-Up Genius" app was utilized to obtain volunteers who were new to the PSO. Two of the high school volunteers are recipients of PSO music scholarships for free instrument lessons.

The entrance fee was a very reasonable \$35 per person that

included the small bites provided by our restaurant partners. Each attendee received a Visit Plano gift bag that included a bottle of water courtesy of **H-E-B**; a coupon for one free drink; four door prize tickets, a \$5 coupon for food truck purchase, along with other items. Everyone received a wristband in exchange for their ticket to show they belonged at the event as an easy reference for security.

During the event and afterwards, rave reviews were received from attendees who stated that they were looking forward to returning next year. Our community partners were also very pleased with the event and excited about participating next year. The PSO is looking forward to growing this event in the coming years and reaching more people within the community with great music.

The Abilene Philharmonic Guild

FASO/ Brazos Valley

Symphony volunteers in Bryan-College Station staged a wildly successful fund-raiser Oct. 19, the second annual "Puttin' on the Ritz" luncheon and fashion show at **Miramont Country Club** in Bryan. The dazzling event, sponsored by Friends Association of the Symphony Orchestra (FASO), attracted more than 200 attendees and raised about \$30,000 for the Brazos Valley symphony Orchestra (BVSS).

This year's theme, "Into the Wild," provided the inspiration for a massive decorative jungle

backdrop at the registration table, intricate tablescapes at each of twenty-one luncheon tables and even the ensembles models wore in the fashion show. All evoked patterns, impressions and moods of the jungle, safari and the "Wild, Wild West." Many patrons joined in the spirit of the festivities by wearing costumes or outfits that featured exotic florals, animal prints. leather. rhinestones. studs. faux fur and western hats. In fact, prizes were awarded to several attendees for their creativity in dressing for the theme.

Emcee of the gala was local media personality, **Mary Mike Hatcher**. Following an invocation delivered by **Mark Taylor**, FASO President **Sandy Farris**, BVSO conductor **Marcelo Bussiki** and BVSS President **Cathy Loving** offered introductory remarks about the various entities involved in promotion of the Brazos Valley Symphony.

The highlight of the occasion was the fashion show, in which about twenty-five models strutted the runway in high-fashion clothing ranging from ultracasual sportswear to glamorous formal attire, all exhibiting "Into

the Wild" colors, patterns, motifs and even accompanying music. Some models were recruited from the community and others were provided by Witt's End Boutique, Sabi Boutique and **Suede Boutique**. The businesses also loaned fashions for the show. Children and youth from Brazos Valley Troupe clad in animal costumes cavorted on the runway in the manner of "The Lion King." Mark Taylor injected a comic element in his exaggerated vocal rendition of the 1960's pop classic, "Wild Thing." Weaving among the tables in a dramatic nightclub fashion, he drew hearty laughter and capped the entertainment with a whimsical touch.

FASO has sponsored symphony fund-raising teas and fashion shows in Bryan-College Station in the past, but the most recent version was dubbed the first annual *"Puttin' on the Ritz"* luncheon and vintage fashion show in 2022. One of the first galas held locally after the decline of covid, that event garnered impressive attendance, raves from the patron community and a record-breaking financial donation to the symphony.

Texans for the Arts led the legislative strategy in the 86th Session that led to the largest budget increase for the Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA) in the history of the agency, including the first \$10 million appropriation to fund the TCA's Cultural District project grants.

In large part due to the efforts of Texans for the Arts the 85th Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 1221 with the intent of increasing local government transparency while also allowing the public to better understand the state's patchwork of state, county and municipal Hotel Occupancy Taxes.
